STUDENT LOAN ALERT Deadline February 10th

The Biden administration is at it again with plans that will further wreck our economy. You can push back by commenting **TODAY** in the Federal Register and telling the Department of Education that they are overstepping their mandate, again, and have no business being involved with fiscal matters of this magnitude.

Named "Improving Income-Driven Repayment for the William D. Ford Federal Direct Loan Program," this proposal is mass debt cancellation.

For those who worked their way through college or sacrificed to send their children, this is an insult. For those who have not gone to college, but went straight to work, this proposal unfairly forces them to pay another person's debts.

- Costs over \$100 billion.
- Undermines Congress' legislative authority.
- Bribes voters.
- Partially cancels debt for 98% of college graduates.

- Raises tuition costs for future students.
- Cuts millions of student loans by more than 75%.

Counties hold annual precinct meetings during the month of February. A lot of people have never been to a precinct meeting. There is a lot of confusion and misconceptions about precincts.

Precincts are the smallest subdivision of our political party. They are composed of Republicans in a neighborhood or a group of nearby neighborhoods. Each precinct has a chair, vice chair and secretary who are elected every other year and hold office for two years. This is an election year for precinct officials.

Precinct chairs have a voting seat on the County GOP Executive Committee. This is a powerful vote, as the Executive Committee makes important decisions such as nominating candidates for vacancies in office, setting the GOP platform, shaping GOP policy and practices, voting on censure or other resolutions, and much more.

Precinct chairs also represent the action arm of the party by keeping their precinct members informed of issues and events, recruiting volunteers, hosting events, and campaigning. While a single precinct may be small, it is very strong and powerful.

If you want to Love Thy Neighbor this Valentine's Month, come meet them at your local precinct meetings.

On January 25, the NC General Assembly came back in session. The day began with the traditional breakfast fundraiser of the Committee to Elect Republican Women, and NCFRW was a \$1,000 sponsor. Temporary rules are passed and committees are organized, members are already filing bills. Many bills will be filed in the first few weeks, but it will

likely be mid-February or later before bills are heard in any committee.

NCFRW will have a Legislative Day this spring, the date will be announced soon.

Keep Nine Amendment by Martha Jenkins



The Keep Nine Amendment was refiled in the U.S. House of Representatives (HJR 8) and five of our NC Congressmen have cosponsored so far - Rep. Patrick McHenry, Rep. Dan Bishop, Rep. Virginia Foxx, Rep. Greg Murphy, and Rep. Richard Hudson.

If you don't see your Congressman's name on this list, call their office, whether Republican or Democrat, and ask them to cosponsor HJR 8. The Senate version hasn't been filed yet but is expected in mid-February. It's not too early to call Senators Budd and Tillis and ask them to cosponsor the bill that Senator Ted Cruz will be filing.

Campaign Contributions Limit

Campaign Contribution Limit Increased to \$6,400

Effective January 1, 2023, the contribution limit for NC candidates and political committees increased from \$5,600 to \$6,400. No individual or political committee may contribute more than \$6,400 to a candidate committee or political committee in any election.

Each odd-numbered year, the State Board of Elections calculates the contribution limit based on changes to

the consumer price index. The index increased 14.3477% from July 2020 to July 2022.

Exceptions to the contribution limit:

- A candidate or candidate's spouse may contribute unlimited amounts to that candidate's committee.
- Any national, state, district or county executive committee of a political party recognized under N.C.G.S. § 163-96 is exempt from the limits.

If there is a primary and a general election, the political committee may receive \$6,400 from a contributor between the beginning of the election cycle and the day of the primary, and another \$6,400 from the same contributor beginning the day after the primary through the end of the election year.
